State Black Caucus to hold reception for Ted

Officials of the Indiana Black Caucus, which will meet here this week-end with an executive board meeting in Foster's Pearl's Lounge Friday, June 16, and general sessions Saturday at the Atkinson Hotel downtown, announced this week that it will also hold a special "Ted Wilson for Attorney General Reception" Saturday evening for delegates to next week's Democratic State Convention. The delegate reception to support the candidacy of Indianapolis black attorney Theodore D. (Ted) Wilson for the Democratic nomination for the important post of Indiana Attorney General will be held at the Downtowner Motel, 421 North Pennsylvania, from 6:30 p.m. to 8:30 p.m. Saturday evening, June 17, and will be open to both black and white delegates to the Democratic convention. A spokesman for the Caucus, which will be chaired at the week-end meeting here by Mayor Richard G. Hatcher of Gary, Ind., and Julius Shaw of Indianapolis, said that the purpose of the special reception is "both to demonstrate the statewide solidarity of black support for Brother Ted Wilson, and to make crystal clear to all leaders of both political parties that there is now a united, cohesive and statewide black political force in Indiana to be heard and heeded on all important issues." Earlier this week, prominent political personalities attended a reception held by Atty. Wilson last Sunday at the downtown Knights of Columbus, 13th and Delaware, for Marion County delegates to the upcoming State Convention.
